



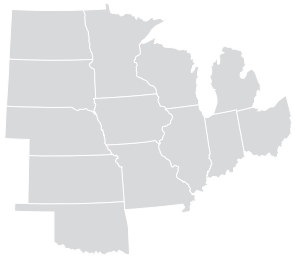
The Charles and Kathleen Manatt Fellowship Democracy Studies Fellowship Program

Overview

Manatt Fellows receive a stipend of \$5,000

The Manatt Fellowship Program at IFES brings outstanding graduate students to Washington, D.C. each year to conduct research in democracy development, election administration and civic participation in the political process. Manatt Fellows receive a stipend of \$5,000 and must complete a paper for public or IFES internal presentation. Fellows have the benefit of mentorship from IFES' international election and democracy experts on staff, and access to IFES' F. Clifton White Virtual Resource Center collection.

Eligibility



The Manatt Fellowship is open to students who have completed their undergraduate studies and who are working towards a graduate degree in International Relations, Political Science, Public Administration or a related area at a university in one of the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota or Wisconsin. The fellowship is ideally suited for graduate students in either Master's or PhD programs who are in the process of exploring areas of interest for their dissertation research or are in the early stages of such research. Research proposals with an applied focus are given preference.

The F. Clifton White Applied Research Center for Democracy and Elections (ARC)

As a premiere collection, the F.
