The Charles and Kathleen Manatt Fellowship Democracy Studies Fellowship Program

The Charles and Kathleen Manatt Democracy Studies Fellowship Program at the [International Foundation for Electoral Systems](http://www.ifes.org) (IFES) brings outstanding graduate students to the Washington, D.C. area each year to support fellows' independent research in democracy development, election administration, legal frameworks and civic participation in the political process. Previous fellows have found the Manatt Fellowship to be an excellent boost to their careers in international development or research. Manatt Fellows have direct access to IFES experts in democracy building and research and benefit from Washington, D.C.'s wide network of democracy professionals, institutions, and resources.

Once at IFES, Manatt fellows are supported by the [Center for Applied Research and Learning](http://www.ifes.org) and carry out their self-directed research under the mentorship of IFES staff during a fellowship term of six to 10 weeks. As IFES' primary research unit, the Center generates innovative applied research to enhance the practice of democracy-building and bolster development of democratic and participatory institutions, processes, and culture.

Manatt Fellows receive a stipend of \$5,000 and must complete a paper for public or IFES internal presentation.

Eligibility

The Manatt Fellowship is open to students who have completed their undergraduate studies and who are working toward a graduate degree in international relations, political science, public administration, law or a related field at a university in the following states: **Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota or Wisconsin.**

The fellowship is ideally suited for graduate students in either master's or Ph.D. programs who are in the process of exploring areas of interest for their dissertation research or are in the early stages of such research, or law students who are pursuing a focus in international or comparative law. Successful applicants will demonstrate how their research can directly benefit from IFES' institutional expertise, as well as how their research could contribute to IFES' technical leadership in the democracy and election assistance field.

How to Apply

If you are interested in working with a pioneering organization in the field of democracy assistance, we encourage you to apply for the William and Kathy Hybl Democracy Studies Fellowship Program.

For an application to be considered complete, applicants must provide the following:

- **1 application**, to be filled out at this site: <https://ifesfellowships.wufoo.com/forms/s9izwo01p4ublc/>
- **1 copy** of your current graduate transcript (to be uploaded with the application form);
- **1 copy** of your CV (to be uploaded with the application form);
- **1 copy** of an unpublished academic writing sample up to 10 pages, which may be an excerpt, to be evaluated for originality of thought, writing quality, and rigor of research design (to be uploaded with the application form); and
- **2 letters of recommendation**, one from a faculty member familiar with our work and one from another source, to be submitted via email to lreppell@ifes.org directly from the recommender.

Application forms and additional documents must be submitted by Sunday, March 18, 2018. We anticipate awarding fellowships by April 20, 2018 for fellowships in the summer of 2018.
