

2019 INDONESIA PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION



Basic Information

Basic Information

- Legal Basis: Law No. 7/2017 on General Elections
- The law states that any political party or coalition of political parties that won 25 percent of valid votes or won at least 20 percent of the seats in the DPR in the previous legislative election can nominate a pair of candidate for president and vice president.
- The president and vice president are elected directly by the people as a pair.
- None of the 10 parties with seats in the current DPR met this threshold, and therefore had to form a coalition in order to field candidates.
- Requirement to win the race: win an absolute majority of valid votes (50 percent, plus one)
- Election result disputes are settled by the Constitutional Court between May 23 and June 15, 2019
- April 25, 2019 – May 22, 2019 - Vote Recapitulation and Result Determination for Presidential election at KPU in Jakarta
- Result Disputes Adjudication Process:
 - May 23 - May 25, 2019 – disputes are submitted to MK (maximum of 3 working days after KPU's final announcement of the results).
 - If cases accepted, the case will be formally registered on June 11, 2019.
 - Time frame for adjudication process: June 11 – June 28, 2019 - Article 475(3) of the law regulates, MK should settled the cases within 14 days since the cases was registered at MK.
- The presidential inauguration will be held on October, 2019

9. Synergize the regional government within the framework of the Unitary State.

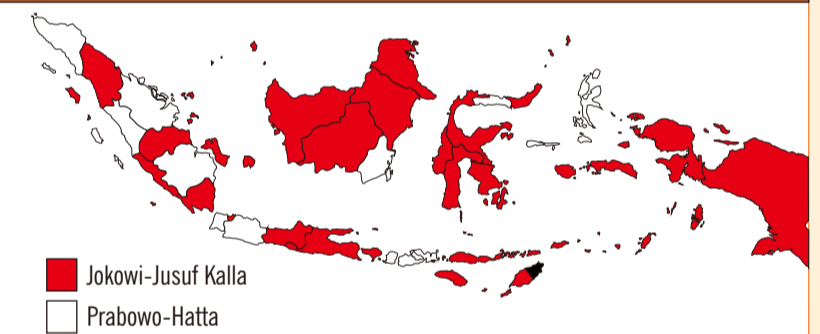
Vision

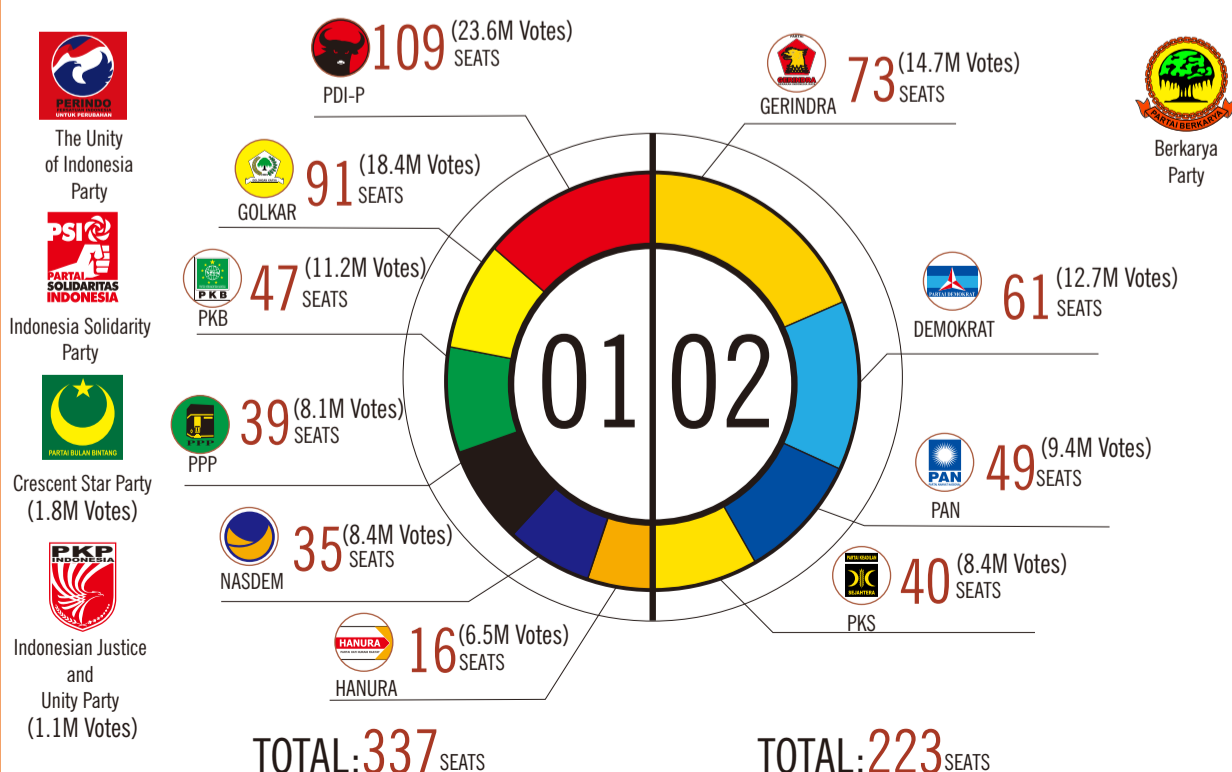
