INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS

INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS: VOTE ONLY ONE BALLOT CARD AT A TIME. PLACE THE BALLOT CARD UNDER THE PLASTIC SO THAT IT LIES COMPLETELY FLAT IN THE BALLOT CARD TRAY.

To express your preference for a candidate for nomination for President, PUNCH OUT THE CROSS (+) in the voting square to the right of the name of the candidate. Your vote in this portion of the ballot is advisory only.

To vote for a candidate whose name appears on the ballot, PUNCH OUT THE CROSS (+) in the voting square to the right of the candidate's name. Where two or more candidates for the same office are to be elected, PUNCH OUT THE CROSS (+) after the names of all candidates for the office for whom you desire to vote, not to exceed, however, the number of candidates to be elected.

To vote for a qualified WRITE-IN candidate, write the person's name in the blank space provided for that purpose after the names of the other candidates for the same office and PUNCH OUT THE CROSS (+) to the right of the name you have written in, or your vote will not be counted.

To vote on any measure, PUNCH OUT THE CROSS (+) in the voting square after the word "YES" or after the word "NO."

All distinguishing marks or erasures are forbidden and make the ballot void.

If you wrongly punch, tear or deface any portion of your ballot cards, replace the cards in the ballot envelope, return it to the Precinct Board Member and obtain another set.

MAKE SURE YOU VOTE BOTH SIDES OF YOUR BALLOT CARDS.

AFTER YOU HAVE COMPLETED VOTING, place your ballot cards in the ballot envelope with the NUMBERED STUBS AT THE TOP and hand it to the Precinct Board Member who shall, in the presence of the voter, remove the numbered stubs, hand same to voter and deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box.

HOW TO VOTE YOUR BALLOT CARDS

STEP 1


Vote only one ballot card at a time. Slip ballot all the way into tray UNDER clear plastic cover from left side of machine.

STEP 2

Move the chrome punch lever with its red plastic pointer to the right of the candidate or measure of your choice and completely depress the lever which will punch out the cross (+). Repeat the process until you have voted for all candidates or measures of your choice.

STEP 3

After you have completed voting, return the chrome punch lever to the top position. Place your ballot cards with the stubs at the top, in the ballot envelope and hand it to the Precinct Board Member.

STATEMENT OF CANDIDATE FOR SUPERVISOR, 5th DISTRICT

COWLES MAST AGE: 63

Occupation: Farmer and Yolo County Supervisor

Education and Qualifications: More than three years have passed since I was elected Supervisor. I believe I have represented this sprawling rural and urban district well, and I have listened and learned.

The 5th District stretches from one end of the county to the other--from Rumsey to Elkhorn and from Knights Landing to Winters and a large portion of western Woodland. I've been close to Woodland all my life and I enjoy representing the city on the board. I understand the pressures and concerns the city is facing--and many aren't that different from those before the county.

Over these years, many of you have gotten to know me, and what I stand for. You know I am not a politician, but a citizen-farmer representing you. You know I will strive to protect our agricultural economy and way of life as we inevitably grow. And we must have some growth to pay for county services. I support development which is agriculturally related, such as the prune drying plant near Winters. It not only generates much-needed tax dollars, but also is an asset to the agricultural industry.

You know that I am particularly concerned that Yolo County has a reliable surface water supply for our future. Although we're in better shape than many other counties at the present time, we are situated between ever-sprawling metropolitan areas of Sacramento and San Francisco. We will grow. Just how, when and where that growth occurs and the need for an adequate water supply are issues on which I will work and provide leadership.

You know that I study the issues and then make an independent decision on what is best for my district and the county. In addition to farming, I spend about 40 hours a week on supervisorial duties and have attended 99 percent of the board meetings. I also serve on a variety of boards and commissions.

I've spent my entire life in Yolo County, attended Yolo County schools including UC Davis. I have served on the County Board of Education, the Esparto School Board, County Farm Bureau Board and I am a former Madison Fire District Commissioner.

This County has given me so much during the course of my life. It feels great to be able to give something back. Yolo County is a great place to live, and I'll do everything I can to make sure it stays that way.

STATEMENT OF CANDIDATE FOR SUPERVISOR, 5th DISTRICT

FRANK SIEFERMAN

AGE: 65

Occupation: Retired farmer/landowner

Education and Qualifications: I am a third generation resident of Yolo County, Born in Woodland December 30, 1926. I attended schools in Woodland, graduating from Woodland High School. Thereafter I served in the U.S. Maritime Service from 1944-1945. I married Jane Long in 1948 and have farmed in the Zamora area since 1949, retiring in 1992. We have three children; Frank, Jr., Carol, and Elizabeth. I have served as Chairman of Dunnigan-Zamora Farm Bureau and as a Director of Yolo County Farm Bureau; Zamora 4-H Sheep Leader; Organized and served as Director and Chairman of Northern Yolo Resource Conservation District, which was later consolidated into Yolo County Resource Conservation District. During that time I was instrumental in getting a State of California 1144 Grant to complete the Yolo County Soil Survey; Served as a member and Chairman of California State Resource Commission by appointment in 1968 and 1972; Served six years on Yolo County Planning Commission. I have a continuing interest in the wise use and protection of our resources, including our most productive farmland. I am concerned about the growth in rural areas, and any development of an area should be based on good long range planning.

Occupation: Manager

Education and Qualifications: I am a life-long resident of Winters. After graduating from Winters High School, I attended American River College and California Polytechnic University, San Luis Obispo. I am a department manager with Beatrice Hunt-Wesson in Davis, a Lieutenant Colonel in the California Army National Guard and a graduate of the United States Army Command & General Staff Course. Following six years of service on the Winters Planning Commission, I was elected to the Winters City Council in 1980. I have served on the Council since, both as a council member and as Mayor.

As your Mayor during these last four years, I have worked diligently on the Winters General Plan. I have tried to preserve, in the General Plan, the small-town quality of Winters. The pace of life, and the calm, are reasons I have made my home here. Unfortunately, my council tenure includes the period of failing local businesses. I have been working with the local Chamber of Commerce and local business people on this General Plan, to reverse the unfavorable business climate and to make sure that the controlled growth will revitalize and encourage local businesses. Bedroom communities have no character to them, no feeling. I was raised here in a community of about 2,000 people, with a department store, a five and dime, a jeweler, a butcher, car dealerships, four grocery stores, shoe repair shops, and a train station. Aside from Southern Pacific, all were locally owned.

Now, with nearly 5,000 people, most of these are gone. Because bedroom communities cannot fund adequate city services, they are destined to deteriorate. We need a business and residential balance. It is the business sector that provides jobs on all income levels, and that generates taxes for all classes of housing stock.

I wish to serve again on the council, and help as we now adopt and implement the General Plan. I ask for your support.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY COUNTY COUNSEL YOLO COUNTY ADVISORY MEASURE N

Measure N presents the issue whether California should be divided into two separate states. It is an advisory measure. It allows the voters to voice their opinion on that substantive issue.

Adoption of the measure would have no legal effect on existing law. Its operation is to permit the voters to voice their opinion on the substantive issue of division of California into two separate states.

A "yes" vote expresses an opinion in favor of such a division. A "no" vote expresses an opinion in opposition to such a division.

Any division of California is governed by Section 3 of Article 4 of the U.S. Constitution. It specifies that no state may be formed within the jurisdiction of any other state without the approval of the legislature of the state affected as well as of Congress. The California Legislative Counsel has concluded that, while the U.S. Constitution does not require it, Congress might condition its consent on separate approval by the people of the territory of either or both of the new states.

Congress could consider the voice of the people in deciding whether to approve a division of California. It could also consider that voice in deciding whether to condition its approval on further approval by the people. The California Legislature could consider the voice in deciding whether to approve the division.

The California Constitution does not contain any provision for splitting the state.

Measure O presents the issue whether Yolo County should be included in the new 51st state if one is formed out of Northern California. It is an advisory measure. It allows the voters to voice an opinion on that substantive issue.

Adoption of the measure would have no effect on existing law. Its operation is to permit the voters to voice their opinion on the substantive issue of including Yolo County in the new 51st state if one is formed out of Northern California.

A "yes" vote expresses an opinion in favor of such inclusion. A "no" vote expresses an opinion in opposition to such inclusion.

Any division of California must be approved by both the California Legislature and Congress. Each could consider the voice of the people in deciding whether to approve the division of California.
