**NOTE: You do not have to vote the ballot in front of a Notary Public. Only your signature must be witnessed by a Notary Public. IN MISSOURI, A NOTARY PUBLIC MUST WITNESS YOUR SIGNATURE ON THE AFFIDAVIT WITHOUT CHARGE.**

**Military personnel, their spouse and dependents, any resident of the State of Missouri residing outside the boundaries of the United States, or any permanently disabled person who has filed a physician's statement with the Election Board attesting to his permanent disability is not required to obtain a notary's seal.**

If you have difficulty in locating a Notary Public, check with your bank or city hall. College students should check with the administration office or student union.

Place the secrecy envelope with the ballot card into the completed and notarized return envelope. Your voted ballot must be received in the Election Board Office not later than 7:00 P.M. on election day. The ballot must be returned either through the U.S. Postal Service or in person by the voter.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO.12**

*Proposed by Initiative Petition*

Shall Article III of the Constitution of Missouri be amended by adding a new section eight that would prohibit a person from serving more than eight years in either the state house of representatives or state senate, or a total of sixteen years in both houses, with any service resulting from an election or appointment occurring prior to the effective date of this amendment not counted toward the total number of years a person could serve? There could be indirect cost to state government; there would be no cost to local government.

United States Representatives from serving more than four terms and to apply to those terms of office which begin on or after this section becomes effective, with this section taking effect only after one-half of the states enact term limits for their members of congress; and further, should this section be found invalid the people of Missouri would intend their federal elected officials to voluntarily comply with its provisions? Authorizes riverboat gambling excursions on the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers, regulated by the State Tourism Commission. Excursions may originate where locally approved by the voters. Five hundred dollar maximum loss limit per person per excursion. The proposal is intended to produce increased General Revenue.
