PUBLIC QUESTIONS	<p>#1 JOBS, SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY BOND ISSUE 7-1 Should the "Jobs, Science and Technology Bond Act of 1984" which authorizes the State to issue bonds in the amount of \$90,000,000.00 for the purpose of creating jobs by the establishment of a network of advanced technology centers at the State's public and private institutions of higher education and for the construction and improvement of technical and engineering related facilities and equipment as well as job training and retraining programs in high technology fields at these institutions, and in a principal amount sufficient to refinance all or any of these bonds if the same will result in a present value savings, providing the ways and means to pay that interest of such debt and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof, be approved? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: Approval of this act would authorize the sale of \$90,000,000.00 in bonds to be used for the establishment and construction of a network of advanced technology centers at the State's public and private institutions of higher education to act as an incentive for the expansion and creation of high technology industry and jobs in every region of the State, and for construction and improvement of technical and engineering related facilities and equipment as well as job training and retraining programs in high technology fields at these institutions, and bonds in a sufficient amount to refinance all or any of such bonds if the same will result in a present value savings.</p>											<p>#2 HUMAN SERVICES FACILITIES CONSTRUCTION BOND ISSUE 7-2 Should the "New Jersey Human Services Facilities Construction Bond Act of 1984" which authorizes the State to issue bonds in the amount of \$60,000,000.00 for the planning, construction, reconstruction, development, erection, acquisition, extension, improvement, rehabilitation, and equipping of human services facilities, and in a principal amount sufficient to refinance all or any of these bonds if it will result in a present value savings, and providing the ways and means to pay for the principal and interest on these bonds, be approved? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: Approval of this act would authorize the sale of \$60,000,000.00 in bonds to be used (1) to bring human services facilities into compliance with Life Safety Code requirements; (2) to maintain physical plant accreditation standards; (3) to upgrade solid waste facilities at human services institutions; (4) to provide grants to establish alternative residential facilities for deinstitutionalized individuals; (5) to replace, rehabilitate, repair and improve human services facilities; (6) and provide bonds in a sufficient amount to refinance all or any of these bonds if it will result in a present value savings.</p>											<p>#3 DEDICATION OF CERTAIN MOTOR FUELS TAXES FOR THE TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM IN THIS STATE 7-3 Do you approve amending Article VIII, Section II of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey to dedicate for 17 years an amount equivalent to the revenue derived from 50.025 per gallon of the existing tax on motor fuels, which has not been previously dedicated by law, to a special account in the General Fund, and authorizing the Legislature to enact laws appropriating these moneys only for the purposes of paying or financing the cost of planning, acquisition, engineering, construction, reconstruction, repair and rehabilitation of the transportation system in this State? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: If this proposed constitutional amendment is adopted, the revenue derived from 2 1/2 cents per gallon of the existing motor fuels tax will go into a special account in the General Fund for 17 years, to be appropriated by the Legislature only for the purposes of paying or financing the cost of planning, acquisition, engineering, construction, reconstruction, repair and rehabilitation of the transportation system in this State.</p>											<p>#4 SENIOR CITIZENS CLUBS AND ASSOCIATIONS AUTHORIZED TO CONDUCT RAFFLES 7-4 Shall the Constitution be amended, as agreed to by the Legislature, to authorize senior citizens associations and clubs to conduct raffles for the support of such clubs and organizations? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: In 1972 the Constitution was amended to permit senior citizens organizations to conduct bingo games and to use the proceeds therefrom for the support of such organizations. This amendment would extend the same privilege with respect to the conducting of raffles by such organizations.</p>											<p>#5 ALLOWS A PERSON TO RECEIVE BOTH A VETERAN'S TAX DEDUCTION AND A SENIOR CITIZEN'S TAX DEDUCTION 7-5 Do you approve the amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, providing that the Legislature may, by law, authorize persons 65 years of age or over or persons permanently and totally disabled who are entitled to a "veteran's" tax deduction and are also entitled to a "senior citizens" tax deduction to receive both simultaneously? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: This amendment to the State Constitution allows persons 65 years of age or over or persons permanently and totally disabled to receive both "veteran's" tax deductions and "senior citizens" tax deductions simultaneously.</p>											<p>#6 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TAXATION OF CERTAIN RETIREMENT BENEFITS PROHIBITED 7-6 Shall the amendment to Article VIII, Section 1, paragraph 17 of the Constitution of New Jersey, prohibiting taxation of payments received under the Railroad Retirement Act, the Railroad Retirement Act, or any federal law which substantially restricts the provisions of those laws, be approved? INTERPRETATIVE STATEMENT: Under current law, Social Security and Railroad Retirement benefits are not subject to taxation by the State. This amendment would prohibit any future taxation of these benefits or any benefits received under any federal law which substantially restricts the Social Security and Railroad Retirement laws.</p>											<p>#7 "Do you want prison inmates who are AIDS victims from throughout the State of New Jersey housed in the City of Newark?" 9-7 EXPLANATORY STATEMENT: "The State of New Jersey has reportedly proposed the establishment of a Prison Unit at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (Marland Hospital) for State Prison inmates suffering from AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome). AIDS is a recently discovered disease that has thus far affected a relatively small percentage of the population but with a very high rate of death for those afflicted. Medical Science is uncertain as to exactly how AIDS is spread from one person to another. However, this virus can be transmitted to State officials, law enforcement officers, and other persons who come in contact with AIDS victims. This question is non-binding and does not have the force of law. A 'Yes' vote indicates that a person is in favor of an AIDS Unit being established in Newark for State Prisoners. A 'No' vote indicates that a person is not in favor of establishing an AIDS Unit in Newark for State Prisoners.</p>

**VOTERS! ATTENTION!**  
Familiarize yourselves with this ballot and instructions. It will assist you in voting, and save time on Election Day.

**IMPORTANT!**  
All voters who can, should vote early in the day and thus avoid possibility of congestion and inconvenience to themselves and others near the close of the polls.

**INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS**

1. Move the red handle of the curtain lever to the right as far as it will go, and leave it there. (This closes the curtains and unlocks the machine for voting.)
2. Turn down pointers over the words Yes or No in the Public Questions Column and over the name of each candidate of your choice from this

position to this position

Name of CANDIDATE

and leave it down. If you desire to change your vote from one candidate to another, or your vote on a Public Question, you may do so by merely turning up any pointer in question, and then turning down any other pointer of your choice.

Your final choice of pointers must be left down or the votes will not record.

3. Starting at the left of the face of the machine, in the Public Questions Column, vote by turning down pointers over the words Yes or No on each of the Public Questions to be voted upon. Continuing at the left of the face of the machine, turn down the pointer for Presidential Electors over the names of the Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates of your choice and leave it down. Continuing, turn down one pointer for United States Senator, one pointer for Member of the House of Representatives, one pointer for Register of Deeds and Mortgages, four pointers for Members of the Board of Chosen Freeholders-At-Large, one pointer for District Freeholder, and the appropriate number of pointers for Towns with municipal elections, if any. The machine will not permit you to vote for more than the legal number of candidates for any office.

4. To cast a write-in vote, Personal Choice, raise desired slide at top of machine, over Office Title, and write name or use pointer for Personal Choice candidates you desire.

5. After turning down all the pointers you desire, leave them down, (or, if you have voted in the Personal Choice section), then move the red handle of the curtain lever to the left as far as it will go, and leave it there. (This records your vote, returns all pointers and slides to their unvoted position, and opens the curtains.)

**REMEMBER: No votes are counted until the red handle is moved back to the left.**
