


The provinces have their own'legislature and they are run by the executive committees. The executive committees are chaired by the Premiers.


All nine premiers of the provinces meet with the national government ministers to check that the RDP is being properly carried out and that funds are being spent according to RDP principles.

# **PROVINCIAL AND** LOCAL GOVERMENT









