'Kids Voters' Re-energize Dismal Election Day Turnout

On November 3, millions of students across the US, including several thousand in New Hampshire will have the opportunity to head to the polls to cast a ballot-helping to combat the crisis which puts democracy at risk. This crisis is real and alarming. In 1996, only 30 percent of those aged 18-24 voted. In most cities, the mayor is elected by less than 10 percent of the eligible voters. But there is hope for the future. As Keepers of Democracy, Kids Voting USA/New Hampshire programs are preserving democracy in the '90's and on into the 21st century.

How it works. Kids Voting USA/New Hampshire is a private, nonpartisan, nonprofit, grassroots organization in the schools, community, and home. The Kids Voting curriculum prepares students for election day with handson action and research based activities. The program culminates on election day when kids go to the polls, accompanied by parent or guardian, to cast their own ballots, in their own voting booths, on the same issues and candidates as adults. Results are reported to the media just as official results are.

Program scope. In 1998, the Kids Voting USA network comprises:

- 5 million students
- 40 states, plus the District of Columbia
- 200,000 teachers
- 80,000 volunteers



- 16,000 voter precincts
- 6,000 schools

For 1998 in New Hampshire

- 24,000 students
- 51 schools
- 39 voting wards
- 500 volunteers
- 6 school districts

The Impact. Stanford University research shows that students who participate in Kids Voting know and care about political events. They become active and attentive citizens, learning skills that are likely to stay with them as adults. In addition, it changes the behavior of students and as importantly, their parents. Kid Voting communities see adult voter turnout increase between five percent and 10 percent.*

Private Sector Support. Kids Voting USA/New Hampshire

receives all its funding from the private sector. Corporations and private foundations have been the key lines of support. Kids Voting NH- Greater Portsmouth

Kids Voting Greater Portsmouth Area successfully completed its first round of elections in 1997. And 1998 looks to be more exciting as others join the program. The towns of Greenland and Rye will be using the Kids Voting curriculum in their classrooms. In May the Greater Portsmouth Chamber of Commerce hosted Chamber Children's Day. The 8th annual event, sponsored by Fleet Bank and Harvard Pilgrim Health Care of New England, brought thousands of families into downtown Portsmouth for an afternoon of activities. Kids Voting Greater Portsmouth had a booth at the event. At the booth, children could experience a democracy by voting on three ballot questions, participate in a government and history trivia game, and enter to win Kids Voting prizes. The booth drew hundreds of children who were excited to have the opportunity to have their voice heard.

Teacher Training held in Manchester

On April 16, 1998 a Teacher Workshop was held in Manchester for teachers working with the Kids Voting USA curriculum. More than 50 teachers from the North Country, Concord, Merrimack Valley, Greenland, Rye, and Manchester worked with Shari Middleswart, the Community Education Specialist for Kids Voting USA. Shari is responsible for development and maintaining the Kids Voting USA Curriculum and developing and implementing teacher training for the Kids Voting program. Kids Voting is a "creative, action packed, learn by doing" curriculum. Many teachers with experience in the curriculum as well as new teachers to the curriculum participated in the workshop. Developed by teachers for teachers, it is a comprehensive series of K-12 classroom activities that enable students to acquire knowledge through

personal experience that bridges the community with the classroom and culminates with the act of voting at official polls on election day. It is considered to be one of the more innovative curricula of the past decade. Overall, the Kids Voting curriculum is a key preparer for election day that stimulates youth and adults, at home and at school. Its goal is to develop information gath-
