THE KING AND WE

THE KING (alias Leroy Norman) is the king in more ways than one. Not only does his name mean "the king" in French (*le roi*), but he has reigned as the king in many areas of our election process.



Leroy's interest in elections began near Milwaukee at the Allen Bradley Co., where he was employed in

various supervisory / management positions. The company encouraged participation in the election process, and he became a precinct captain in his own precinct and helped other precincts as requested.

When Leroy and his wife moved to Florida in 1977, he remembers registering to vote at a Publix store in Largo and telling the registrar there about his interest in elections.



He was soon deputized to register voters and was involved in setting up voter registration in Kash n' Karry, Kmart, and Publix stores; at county fairs; in malls, mobile home parks, and high schools.

For many years Leroy also registered voters during "homestead exemption time" at the Property Appraisers Office on 66th Street. He probably registered more voters than anyone in our offices! When the federal government passed the National Voter Registration Act, effective January 1995, voters could obtain applications at any of a variety of locations, complete and mail them themselves. Registrars were out of business....but not Leroy! He delivers the forms, brochures, and other materials to banks, city halls, libraries, retirement homes, trailer parks, etc.

When votomatics were first used by Pinellas County in 1978, Leroy demonstrated during poll worker classes how to assemble them and how to teach voters to use them. At the Election Service Center, he has worked with the votomatics and other supplies and equipment for as long as we can remember.

At the polls, Leroy's first job was as a clerk for nine precincts in a city election-- a 1979 Largo tax referendum. He remembers having to evacuate the building, with outside temperatures in the 90s, to allow police to search for a bomb!! In the very next city election, incredibly, they had another bomb threat. What a way to begin!

Leroy is still a clerk twenty years later, and **THE KING** reigns supreme. He "runs a tight ship," as all who work with him know.

Leroy is also **THE KING** to two children and four grandchildren and to many community organizations.

Vive le roi!! Long live our king, Leroy!

- One vote gave Oliver Cromwell control of England
