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Meet Secretary Garza



Antonio O. Garza, Jr., 36, was formally sworn in as the new Secretary of State on February 7, 1995. Secretary Garza served as a County Judge for the Cameron County Commissioners Court and attorney for Garza and Garza before his appointment. "I am honored to accept the Governor's appointment and proud to serve the state of Texas," said Garza. "In an effort to increase voter registration and voter participa-

tion, we hope to practice what democracy preaches," Garza said.

A Brownsville native, Garza earned his bachelor of Business Administration in Finance from the University of Texas, and his Doctor of Jurisprudence from Southern Methodist University. He received Diplomate training in Guadalajara, Mexico, and at the University of San Diego.

Secretary Garza's civic involvement includes serving as the director of the Parks Advisory Board to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and as Vice-Chairman for the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission. Garza has been a member of the Community Development Review committee, the State Job Training Coordinating Council, the Census Complete Count Committee, the U.S. Marshall Selection Committee, and was a conferee at the U.S. Fifth Circuit Judicial Conference.

In addition, Secretary Garza volunteers his time to many community organizations. He has served as the Director for the United Way of Southern Cameron County, the Brownsville Adult Literacy Council, the Private Industry Council of Cameron County, the Brownsville Community Health Center Board, and the Texas Business Hall of Fame Foundation. He has served as the President for Big Brothers/Big Sisters of the Rio Grande Valley, participated in the H.O.S.T.S. Program for

- Q How long is the legislature in session?
- The legislature is in session for 140 days. The session convened on January 10th this year and will adjourn May 29th.
- How is a bill introduced to the House of Representatives/Senate?
- Bills in the House of Representatives are introduced by the Speaker of the House, while bills in the Senate are introduced by the Lieutenant Governor. Each bill must be sponsored by a legislator in order for it to be considered as a possible law. Once it is sponsored by a senator or representative, it is eligible to be heard by the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- What steps does a bill go through before becoming a law?
- After a bill has been sponsored by a legislator, it is delegated to a committee for approval or rejection. A public hearing is scheduled so that the committee can hear arguments both for and against the bill. If approved, the bill goes to the calendar committee and is passed to a third reading. A 2/3 vote is required at the final reading for passage. Once signed by the speaker of the house and the lieutenant governor, it is up to the governor to make the final decision whether the bill will become a law. The governor then signs the bill into law or vetoes it.

- Q What committee hears education bills?
- In the House, the Public Education Committee hears all education-related bills, and the Education Committee hears education bills for the Senate.
- Q Who serves on these committees?
- Senate: Ratliff (R)-Chair, Luna (D)-Vice Chair, Barrientos (D), Armbrister (D), Bivins (R), Harris (R), Haywood (R), Montford (D), Nelson (R), Sibley (R), Zaffirini (D)

House: Sadler (D)-Chair, Dear (D)-Vice Chair, Grusendorf (R), Hernandez (D), Hochberg (D) McCoulskey (D), Uher (D), West (R), Williamson (D)

- Q How are these committee members selected?
- Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock appoints the members to the Education Committee (Senate). In addition to Senator Ratliff, Chair of the Committee, there are currently seven other committee chairs assigned to the Education Committee in an effort by Lieutenant Governor Bullock and Governor George W. Bush to give top priority to education. Speaker of the House Pete Laney appoints representatives to the Public Education Committee (House).



Brownsville ISD, and has volunteered in his community for years as a soccer and basketball coach.

Among his many recognitions and awards, Garza was a member of an eight-person delegation to Poland/ Hungary in 1993 sponsored by the American Council of Young Political Leaders. He was named one of the Five Outstanding Young Texans in 1990 by the Texas Jaycees, and one of the Five Outstanding Young Texas Exes in 1989 by the Ex-Students Association of the University of Texas.

Garza was appointed by President George Bush as a member of the official twelve-person Presidential Delegation to observe the 1991 Federal Elections in El Salvador, and was invited by President Bush to be part of the Official Receiving Delegation and an attendee at State dinner upon the first official visit of Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortary to the U.S. in October 1989.

Garza replaces Ronald Kirk, who aspires to be the next Mayor of Dallas.



Assisting Garza is Clark Kent Ervin. Before his appointment, Ervin practiced law with Liddell, Sapp, Zivley, Hill & LaBoon, L.L.P. of Houston. He graduated cum laude from Harvard College with a Bachelor of Arts in Government. A Rhodes Scholar, Ervin received a Master of Arts in Poli-

tics, Philosophy and Economics from Oxford University, and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School with a Juris Doctorate.

Assistant Secretary Ervin was a candidate for U.S. Congress (District 29) in 1992, and previously worked as the Associate Director of the Office of National Service in the Bush White House, and at Vinson & Elkins, L.L.P. of Houston.

Ervin has served as Director of the Houston Committee on Foreign Relations, The Houston Symphony, The Alley Theatre, and the Foundation for Interfaith Research & Ministry.


